Youth Ministry Update



It isn't too often that you can say you have a life-changing experience. That you have felt God's hand upon your shoulder and have watched Him make miracles. Chapel Rock this summer was a life-changing experience. The students at youth group have spent the last handful of weeks asking questions about camp--what to expect and what camp would look like. We got our 12 students up to Chapel Rock and got them settled into their cabins and introduced them to their counselors.

A week without their phones seemed unfathomable to the kids, but we promised they would be busy and have fun. When I left Sunday evening a few students were feeling very unsure about staying, but they were glad Axel would be there with them for the entire week. Axel kept everyone happy and during our daily check-ins had nothing but good things to say. The kids participated in a carnival, kayaked in the lake, did a ropes course, learned countless games, and enjoyed their first campfire s'mores. I headed back up to Prescott on Thursday afternoon and was blown away with what I saw there.

12 kids disconnected from technology, but enjoying every minute of their time. They were painting nails, making bracelets, playing hand games, running around in the trees, and sitting in the sunshine. Within an hour of getting to camp the Chaplain came to find me. She told me that our group of kids were the most kind, welcoming to

others, appreciative, and amazing group of campers they've had all summer. Their counselors echoed the same sentiments.

As the days went on, I was so excited to share such amazing experiences with the kids. The first night the kids went to prayer stations and under the stars I watched them silently walk through different stations praying for themselves and for others. I watched our kids' clear plates at meals, stack chairs, wipe tables, and clean out their cabins. They sat in the sunshine and talked and braided hair.

Their first concern was to make sure they could come back next year, and they couldn't say thank you enough times. I recognize the financial sacrifices you all made to ensure our students made it to Chapel Rock and hope you know the lasting impact camp had on each of them. And on me too.

I want to share three key moments for me as the youth minister. During our last morning at Praxis the students were reflecting on the fruits of the spirit and generosity specifically. The Chaplain asked the kids if they could think of a specific encounter they had with generosity. One of our students raised his hand and said that people at his church sacrificed their money so that he and his friends could come to Chapel Rock and that had changed his life. A second key moment was when we were leaving and we sat in a circle as a youth group. I asked the kids what their favorite part of Chapel Rock was. A student who is 16 raised her hand. She said, with tears in her eyes, it was the first week she could remember in a long time that she got to be a kid. She didn't have to make a meal for her family, clean up, do laundry, or watch a sibling. She got to run around and enjoy childhood. The other kids all shook their heads in agreement. Lastly, when we gave the kids their phones back, I was blown away by the fact that they said they realized life was better without a phone. That they were glad they had a whole week without them.

I want to say thank you to you all for the support you have shown these kids. They left Chapel Rock with their friends' phone numbers scrawled down their arms and with hearts on fire for Jesus.
